Celebration of Brother Bernard Guesdon's 25 years in Rome

On Saturday, March 1, 2025, the Generalate community celebrated Brother Bernard's 25 years of service as archivist of our General Curia in Rome.

Although the sun had been lazy all day, and a fine rain had occasionally tried to make itself felt, Brother Bernard, the sunshine of the day, was well surrounded. The entire community Brothers and Sisters, and also a good number of Brothers of Christian Instruction from Ploërmel, two Sisters of Wisdom from Via Merulana and a large delegation of Montfort Missionaries were

present to honour the archivist and historian. The mass was presided over by Father Antoine Pooda, chaplain of our community, during these weeks.

The mass opened with the hymn of the Jubilee 2000, Christ Yesterday, Christ Today, and ended with the well-known Magnificat 'My soul proclaims the Lord', followed by the customary photo of all the participants gathered around Brother Bernard in the chapel.

After the mass, to lead up to the aperitif, a short 8-minute video prepared by Brother Paul Texier was screened, presenting the various faces of Brother Bernard. Firstly, the Bernard born in Mouchamps, then successively Bernard Montfortian Gabrielist at the novitiate in Boistissandeau (Ardelay), Swiss Bernard in Fribourg (School of Faith), the African Bernard from Senegal and the Congo, and finally Roman Bernard: in short, an eternal Bernard in our memories and in our hearts.



Before presenting him with an icon of Saint Bernard, Brother Dionigi Taffarello, Superior General congratulated and thanked Brother Bernard. Bro. Dionigi said "On behalf of the entire Congregation and the Montfortian Family, on behalf of the entire Generalate community and all those present here and on my own behalf, dear Brother Bernard, I thank you for everything you have done over the past 25 years and for the way in which you have done it, and thank you for the example you have set for us through your testimony."

This was followed by a meal for about forty people, as abundant as it was delicious, interspersed with a song composed by Brother Jean-Marie Thior and performed with the assistance of Brother Sébastien Ndabunganiye.

Dear Fathers, Sisters and Brothers

It is with great joy that we gather here today to celebrate and thank our dear Brother Bernard Guesdon for his 25 years of valuable service in Rome as archivist of our General Curia.

Today, at this time of celebration, we would like to express our sincerest thanks to Brother Bernard, whose service and dedication have enriched our community and the entire Congregation to an extent that deserves to be celebrated.

After 32 years of missionary service in Senegal, Brother Bernard, with a great spirit of obedience, agreed 25 years ago to come to Rome for a new mission: that of archivist,

not with a fixed-term contract (which is unfortunately often the case today in our congregations), but with an open-ended contract... And he did it for 25 years, without ever complaining, without ever asking to change community or mission, because he approached this delicate mission with great passion and love.

Brother Bernard has done meticulous and passionate work as an archivist, carefully preserving our history and our most precious documents. His professionalism has been truly exemplary, and his research into the different aspects of our founder's history and the origins of the congregation will remain important and useful for the whole congregation and the Montfortian family.



The simplicity of his life is no less important. In a world where materialism and selfishness often prevail, Brother Bernard chose to live humbly and soberly, reminding us that true value is found in spirituality and sincere human relationships. His constant focus on community life strengthened the bonds within our community, making every shared moment an opportunity to strengthen community relationships.

Fr Bernard also emphasised the moments of joy and celebration in our community. With his talent as a singer, his skill in the art of rhyming, his keen eye for photography and for special moments, he made every celebration memorable. These are occasions that will

remain engraved in our memories, thanks to his commitment to celebrating life and the important moments in each person's story.

Finally and most importantly, I want to emphasise how Bro. Bernard always put others first, showing a genuine interest and loving attention that made each of us feel unique and valued. He never put himself at the centre of the attention, he always put others first.

That is why, at the end of this message of thanksgiving, I would like to quote a famous text by St Bernard on the role that Mary can play in our lives, a text that certainly also inspired St Louis-Marie de Montfort: 'In dangers, anxieties, uncertainties, think of Mary, call upon Mary. May she never be far from your heart. And to be sure of obtaining the favour of her prayers, do not neglect the example of her life. By following her, you do not go astray; by praying to her, you do not despair; she holds you, you do not collapse; she protects you, you do not fear; she guides you, you do not grow weary; she favours you, you succeed'.

This quotation is also intended as the prayer we all address to Mary, that she may always be your guide, that she may protect you and give

you the health you need to continue to bear witness to your passion for Christ, for the life of a Religious Brother that you have always lived with fidelity and passion.

From the 30th January - 6th February, our community was visited by Brother Dionigi Taffarello, our Superior General. He knows the Brazilian Gabrielite sector well, having accompanied it for about ten years, to the point that, as he himself says, real emotional bonds have been created between him and the Brothers of Brazil. Therefore, it is with great joy that we welcome him, taking the opportunity to benefit from his wise advice and guidance to grow in our community and spiritual life, renew our missionary commitment and reflect calmly and clearly on the future of our presence in Brazil.

During the personal interviews and community meetings we had with Bro. Dionigi, we were able to talk about everything that makes up our life: health, spiritual life, the different aspects of community life, our involvement in CECOM (Centro Educativo e Comunitário São Gabriel) and in the parish community, GAMOS (Gupo dos

Amigos de Montfort) and vocational animation.

If we take into account our small number, the lack of candidates, and the age of Brother Daniel, we can only recognise the fragility of the Brazil sector, without losing hope in a future that, although uncertain, does not depend on us alone. Each of the Brothers in Brazil is therefore preparing for different eventualities. As pilgrims of hope, as Pope Francis encourages us to be, we have complete confidence in the decisions that the Lord will inspire our superiors to make.

We sincerely like to thank Brother Dionigi, who despite the heavy responsibility he bears, did not hesitate to devote an entire week to our small community. We regret that Brother Jean Marie Thior was unable to accompany him on this visit and eagerly await his next visit in October.



Final Vows of Brother José Valdir Moreira

The Superior General's trip had been scheduled such that he could receive the final vows of Brother José Valdir Moreira.

Brother José Valdir began his training in 2014, going through the various stages of pre-postulancy, postulancy and novitiate in the community of Nova Contagem; Brother Marcos Rodarte Junior was his main formator and novice master.



He took his first vows on 8 December 2016. It was Bro. Dionigi, who had received his first vows. From August 2023 to August 2024, Bro. José Valdir stayed in France to learn French and took part in the session and retreat organised by the Central Administration for French-speaking Brothers in Kinshasa.



This ceremony took place on 2 February, during the mass for the feast of the Presentation, which is also World Day for Consecrated Life. The mass was presided over by Fr Carlos, one of the

priests of our parish, in the basic community 'Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal'. For this celebration, Brother Marcos had prepared a leaflet so that the community could accompany him in the best possible way. It had been carefully prepared by the liturgy team and, in particular, by the choir team made up of the children and teenagers of Gamu Mirim (Group of Montfort), the Friends of who had prepared and performed the songs with the greatest care. The celebration of perpetual vows is always a moving ceremony that touches the hearts of the participants and leaves a lasting impression. It is also a small seed sown at random, but which, God willing, may bear fruit in new vocations.

After the celebration, we organised a get-together for all those who had taken part in the ceremony and who had come in large numbers to show their friendship and pray for Brother José Valdir. Our gratitude to all of them for their presence and the support they give to our community.

For those of us in religious life, the vow of poverty is central to our commitment. At the time of our first profession, we were reminded of how to use the resources of the world wisely and with a spirit of detachment. May this call to detachment from material possessions inspire not only religious communities but also all people to lead lives of integrity, generosity, and faithfulness.

As I mark this joyous occasion, I extend my heartfelt gratitude to His Eminence Cardinal Poola Anthony for his gracious presence and for leading this celebration. Your presence is a visible sign of God’s blessings and encouragement for all of us.





I also thank my sisters and relatives, especially those who have come from Vakathanam and Mannanam, for their unwavering support since the time I joined this society as a candidate. Your love and prayers have been a source of strength throughout this journey with the Lord.

My sincere thanks go to the All Saints community and staff for their meticulous planning and efforts in making this day truly special and memorable. Your dedication and hard work are deeply appreciated.

Finally, I thank each one of you, dear Fathers, Brothers, Sisters, friends, and relatives for enriching this celebration with your presence and prayers. Your support and love strengthen us in our commitment to God and His mission. May God continue to bless us all abundantly, and may this celebration inspire us to renew our commitment to living lives of simplicity, service, and love.

A Silver Line

I am delighted to talk about how God accompanied me (sometimes carried me) throughout my life until this day. And as I stand at the crossroads of what is sometimes called 'real life,' I want to extol the importance of surrendering to the Divine. Surrendering to the Divine personally means to me what Mary said to the Angel Gabriel, "Let it be"; what Jesus said to John the Baptist at the River Jordan, "Let it be"; and what Jesus again said to God our Father in the Garden of Gethsemane, "Let it be." At a crucial point in my life, I also said, "Let it be," which you will understand as we traverse through the graph of my life in a few moments.

As a 13-year-old boy, little did I know my parents' intentions. They came from impoverished backgrounds, and neither of them had been to school, but they allowed me





to follow my vocation. Perhaps they thought I would never experience poverty if I joined Religious Life.

Looking back on my life, especially as a 23-year-old at my first profession, it is a slightly uncomfortable experience for the 47-year-old that I have become. I was travelling on a well-trodden road, moving smoothly toward the conventional and sought-after ministry of being the head of an institution.

However, talent and intelligence have not yet inoculated anyone against the caprices of fate. One will never truly know oneself or the strength of one's relationships until both have been tested by adversity. Suddenly, like a bolt from the blue, I had to press the reboot button of my life, losing everything except two things God had given me: my life and my vocation to Brotherhood.

An exceptionally short-lived career as a community superior and school principal imploded, leaving me devastated. The fears that my parents had for me and that I had for myself had both come to pass. By every usual standard, I was the biggest failure I knew.

At that dark phase of my life, my only prayer was: "Lord, now my life is in Your hands... please lead me." There's a hymn in *With Joyful Lips* (Hymn Book) that says: "Here I am, Lord. Is it I, Lord? I have heard You calling in the night. I will go, Lord, if You lead me." Though I had sung this song countless times, its meaning struck me only when, in the early hours of the dawn, I heard a knock at my door. It was the Provincial standing there, asking, "Will you go

to Africa as a missionary?" After a series of high-voltage meetings, where resistance and current were directly proportional. I finally said, "Let it be."

I started the journey without knowing the destination. Destiny seemed more accurate than the destination itself. I had to create a road where there was none. It demanded enormous courage to believe in Jesus' exhortation: "Enter through the narrow door." Ironically, that was the only door open to me while the rest were tightly shut.

I always had a tendency to go against the dictum: "The best way of avoiding problems is to do nothing." My focus was not on what I had become but on what others had become because of me.

Among the numerous definitions of success, the one dearest to me is: "Success is a byproduct of enduring failures." My struggles in life gave me an inner security that no position or post ever could. I realised that I had a strong will, and my experiential knowledge helped me believe that I am *energy*, *energy* that changes its form but is never destroyed.

So, given a Time Turner, I would tell my 23-year-old self that happiness lies not in acquisition or achievement but in the journey itself. Life has no rewind button, only repair. Success is not instant; failure is not constant. This liberating discovery enables me to proceed without fear.

The meeting commenced with a hymn sung by all the members present.

Talk by Bro. T.T. Mathew

Brother T.T. Mathew delivered an insightful talk on 'The Year of Prayer' that preceded the Jubilee Year 2025. He elaborated on the meaning and significance of prayer in our daily life, especially as Montfort Gabrielite Associates. Ten key points drawn from Notes on Prayer by Pope Francis and the pastoral aid Teach Us to Pray were explained with befitting examples. He underscored the statement of Pope Francis. "Prayer is the breath of faith. Prayer is faith's most specific expression." He added that prayer is the spiritual oxygen we all need.

He explained further with Biblical texts that the most fundamental reason why we need to pray is that Jesus himself prayed. In the Gospels there are eighteen different occasions where we find Jesus in prayer. He also emphasised on the centrality of daily family prayer and the need to bring up our children in Christian faith and

tradition. The most common family prayer is the Rosary. Quoting St. John Paul II he added, "The Rosary is also, and always has been, a prayer of and for the family. This prayer was particularly dear to Christian families at one time, and it brought them closer. It is important not to lose this precious inheritance. We must return to the practice of family prayer and prayer for families, continuing to use the Rosary" (Rosarium Virginis Marie, 41).

He further highlighted the significance of the Rosary from the writings of our founder like ‘The Secret of the Holy Rosary’ and ‘The Treatise on the True Devotion to Mary’. St. Louis de Montfort said, “Recite your Rosary with faith, with humility, with confidence and with perseverance.”

The members expressed their gratitude to Brother Mathew for his inspiring talk.

Rosary cum Prayer Service

All participants joined in singing the Rosary. This was followed by the recitation of a prayer taught by Saint Louis Marie de Montfort "Consecration to Jesus Christ, the Incarnate Wisdom through the Hands of Mary". A special prayer was also made to the Holy Family, taken from Amoris Laetitia.

The theme for the rest of the day was the 10 virtues of Mary, as set out by Saint Louis-Marie in no. 108 of his Treatise on True Devotion to Mary: profound humility, living faith, blind obedience, continual prayer, universal mortification, divine purity, ardent charity, heroic patience, angelic gentleness and divine wisdom.

A video with images and biblical texts introduced us to the first three virtues. The next three were worked on in a prayer workshop. The last four were presented in the form of a 'film' with icons depicting the main Gospel episodes about Mary. The images invited us to contemplate the scene and then to find the most visible virtue in each one.

The last activity of the weekend was an hour of assembly to discuss issues common to the group:

setting up the future team of animators and formators for Shared Mission, following up the cause of our martyred Gabriélistes Brothers...

Brother Hubert de Liege wrote in his 70th Anniversary book of Thailand, " Brother Martin de Tours insisted on regularity for the community members. He had a deep respect for his superiors. An exemplary religious for mortification, charity, piety, and zeal for the salvation of souls. He was looked upon as a Saint by all those who knew him."

Rev. Brother Martin de Tours passed away on March 3, 1976 . He was a missionary in Thailand for 32 years. May his soul rest in peace. May his holy and exemplary life inspire us to carry out our mission faithfully.

As a RAHT-Kenya team member, I was privileged to attend this collaborative gathering, which highlighted the urgent need for collective action against human trafficking, modern slavery, and child labour.

The Montfort Brothers have stepped into the light in a world where shadows often lurk. In December 2024, we hosted a youth forum in Kima that focused on piercing through the darkness of covert human trafficking, child labour, and the devastating effects of drugs on the youth. It was not just any forum; it was an opportunity to equip 115 young people from the surrounding areas of Kima village with the knowledge, skills, and resources they need to combat these issues in their communities.



Burundian Bishops' Visit



On February 27, 2025, we hosted three Bishops from Burundi: Msgr. Salvator Niciteretse (Diocese of Bururi), Msgr. Georges Bizimana (Diocese of Ngozi), and Msgr. First edition of the Ourous 2025 diocesan pilgrimage

After receiving the approval of Monsignor MOÏSE, Bishop of the Diocese of Boké, the Priests, Brothers and Sisters of the Deanery of Louis BARRY met on several occasions to set up committees to oversee the various preparatory activities. It was not at all easy, and the involvement of the lay faithful was essential. 'How can we accommodate so many people?' This was the main question under discussion. However, by the grace of God, we were able to identify a few accommodation sites, including the school of the Brothers of Saint Gabriel (the main site), the boarding school of the Sisters of Our Lady of Guinea, and some villages such as Ourous, Ourakar, Youkounkoun and Ithiou.

It is important to point out that the first diocesan pilgrimage took place in Ourous. It brought together several parishes and lasted four days, from 6 to 9 February 2025. On Wednesday night, there was already the great Koundara-Youkounkoun march. After taking a long break



in a village called Thiakour, the pilgrims headed for Youkounkoun on Thursday at 10 a.m., where they received a warm welcome from the parishioners of Ourous and other villages. They find Ithiou in prayer, a village that had once refused the first missionaries. Passing through Ithiou is like following in the footsteps of the first missionaries, in accordance with the theme of the pilgrimage: 'Remember those who have announced the word of God to you and imitate their faith' (Hebrews 13:7). From Ithiou to the great Cross, from the great Cross to the Grotto, and so on, they finish with a prayer and then the pilgrims returns to their accommodation.

'The pilgrims' route begins in front of the Marian grotto. Continuing on our way, we arrive at the cemetery where the missionaries and witnesses of the faith rest. This route continues towards the glorious cross, a powerful symbol of salvation and peace. This journey continues in front of the statue of Saint Rose of Lima. We end our pilgrimage in the church, in front of the Blessed Sacrament'.

Throughout the four days, the main activities were prayer, teachings, masses and confession.

We must salute the presence of the Provincial Superior Brother Etienne KA and Mrs Diop at the pilgrimage.

Saint Gabriel Solidarité in Ourous

We had the great pleasure of welcoming a delegation from Saint Gabriel Solidarité in Ourous from 5 January to 15 January 2025. The aim of their visit was to help the Brothers create a favourable environment for learning through painting, varnishing, repairing the desks and benches and the vegetable garden; something that was requested by the school principal.

On 6 January, we attended the welcoming ceremony for students and teachers with a song and a short performance followed by the welcoming speech of the student president and that of the school principal. Afterwards, they visited the classrooms, the schoolyard, the garden and presented the principal with the gifts they had brought for the students.

On 7 January, after the raising of the flag and the prayer, the students immediately set off for the painting, varnishing of the table and benches and gardening. It took about a week to finish these activities since the walls had to be cleaned

and some of the table-benches repaired. That day, they worked with the students of grades 5 and 3.

While the team was working at the school, I had to accompany Mr Jean Luc to the Koundara prefecture to deal with a visa issue.



On 8 January, it was the turn of the Year 4 students. They really appreciated this small group, which was easy to manage. In the afternoon, they decided to pay their respects at the cemetery near the graves of the first missionaries.

On 10 January, they continued with the painting. They started with the library, then the





refectory and the dormitories of the boarders. In this way, they have just confirmed their generosity, determination and courage. It must be said that they are brave and courageous despite their advancing age.

On 11 January is preparation day for the parents' meeting and to say thank you to the benefactor team. While the parents are in a meeting with the director in the APAE office, Mr Kobae, the secretary of the parents' office, with the director's agreement, accompanies our friends to a few surrounding villages to get a feel for the realities of the place. Once the visit was over, they joined the parents at the school to interact with them.

In the afternoon, we went to the village of the mayor of the sub-prefecture of Koundara to attend an initiation ceremony. This marked the end of a fruitful day.

On 13 January, a thanksgiving ceremony by the parents was organised. On this day, each parent brought a traditional meal, as mentioned at the meeting, and some of the older girls were dressed in traditional dress. We began with a dance procession starting from the large cross at the church, and then it was time for speeches (from the parents' president, the school principal and the team leader, Mr David). We also went to the year 5 classroom, where the different traditional meals were on display. This phase ended with a shared meal.



In the afternoon, a match was played between the boys and the girls.

On 14 January, we went on a fun day out. The worker is entitled to his wages. After days of hardwork, it was essential and necessary to find a place to rest. After much deliberation, the choice fell on Guigan, a village located 25 km from Youkounkoun. There, we spent a pleasant day. When we arrived in Guigan, we were welcomed by Father Edouard, an Ivorian national. He is the priest who the Bishop sent to this area. He showed us around the church, some families and the town hall where we had the opportunity to talk to some of the local authorities. At around 01 p.m., we had lunch under the mango trees a little away from the village.

On the morning of 15 January, after breakfast, our friends said goodbye. I have very fond memories of them, generous, brave, resilient, simple and kind men and women who are very sensitive to the needs of the children. May the Spirit of God strengthen them now and forever.

Poverty and food security in DR Congo: What is Montfortian Evangelisation?

With less than five years to go until the deadline for the Sustainable Development Goals of the 2030 Agenda, humanity faces considerable challenges. The objective is clear: to eradicate poverty, guarantee food security and provide quality education for all. Of these 17

ambitious objectives, the Belgian NGO Caritas International is particularly focusing on two issues in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC): poverty and food security.

The situation in the DR Congo: An overview

In 2015, the 192 member states of the United Nations, including Belgium, committed to achieving these 17 goals by 2030. The DR Congo is also part of this dynamic. However, in 2020, a government report revealed that the country ranked 179th out of 189 on the Human Development Index, a worrying sign in a critical context.

Although extreme poverty decreased between 2005 and 2012, it seems to be on the rise again. Several factors explain this situation:



the international economic situation, macroeconomic instability, and worsening conflicts, particularly in the East, Tanganyika and Kasai. Around three quarters of the Congolese population live below the poverty line, a paradox in a country rich in natural resources. However, notable progress has been observed in certain social indicators, such as the reduction in infant mortality, life expectancy at birth and access to electricity.

To combat poverty, the Congolese government allocates almost a third of its budget to a poverty reduction programme. However, this share of funding is decreasing, which could worsen the situation on the ground.

Food insecurity: A growing crisis

The food situation in DR Congo is alarming. More than half (56%) of the Congolese population suffers from hunger, a rate much higher than that of Africa (2.4 times) and the world (5.2 times). Between 2015 and 2019, the number of people suffering from acute food insecurity has exploded, rising from 5.9 to 15.6 million, an increase of 165%.

There are many causes: conflicts, climatic hazards (such as the locust invasion), and the decline of public involvement in the agricultural sector. The consequences of malnutrition are dramatic, directly affecting schooling, with one in five school repetitions due to malnutrition, as well as infant mortality, with 20% of deaths of children under 5 years of age being related to this issue.

What kind of Montfortian evangelisation?

The 33rd General Chapter urged the Montfort Brothers of Saint Gabriel to be prophets for the 21st century. But how can this prophetic presence be embodied in a context of great uncertainty?

Education, which was so dear to Saint Louis-Marie Grignion de Montfort, could be a key vehicle for this action. But how should we respond to the misery that surrounds us?

Should we be content to remain in our schools and communities, or should we go out to meet the poor, following the example of Jesus, who always opened his heart to the most deprived?

Saint Louis-Marie Grignion de Montfort dedicated his life to encouraging others to open their hearts to Jesus. In today's world, the Church remains a driving force for change and the well-being of humanity, while preserving the environment, because the well-being of mankind is intrinsically linked to that of the planet.

In the province of Kinshasa, there is an urgent need to educate people about healthy eating. In fact, 80% of the children attending our schools come from families suffering from food insecurity. 'A hungry stomach has no ears': how can you educate a child's mind if their body is starving? We must re-examine our practices and integrate the promotion of healthy eating into our educational projects, while creating local resources to meet these needs.

A call to action: Nourish humanity, care for nature

Saint Louis-Marie Grignion de Montfort emphasised that humanity is the masterpiece of creation, the living image of divine beauty and perfection. However, sin has tarnished this original beauty, clouding the human spirit and reducing its capacity to love and serve God fully.

To restore this order, we must nourish mankind, take care of animals and birds, and protect nature. Harmony between mankind and its environment is essential for a just and sustainable future.

We, the Montfort Brothers, called to live according to the example of Saint Louis-Marie Grignion de Montfort, have a prophetic role to play in this fight against poverty and food insecurity. Our mission is to educate, to act and to bear witness to the love of God through our concrete actions in favour of the most vulnerable.

Toys... for the children of the world

How did this passion for woodworking come about?

The story begins in 1972. I did my second novitiate in Rome. When I finished, I returned for Christmas to the town of Chinon, where I had lived and worked before leaving for Rome. Of course, my teaching post had been filled! I was a French and history/geography teacher at the Collège Saint-Joseph. I was still left in Chinon: I did some substitutions, some supervision; but the rest of the time, I had to keep myself busy. So I set up a little workshop: I did a lot of soldering, a little woodwork, but I didn't have any machines, yet I was making toys, things for children.

In 1974, I suggested a charity raffle to the headmistress of Saint-Joseph secondary school! I told her: 'I'll organise the whole thing: each raffle ticket will have a prize, I'll make them in large quantities and all that will be left is to buy a few bigger prizes...' and that's what I did. I had 1700 raffle tickets printed and I sold... almost 1700! That brought in 15,000 francs (the equivalent today of just over €3300!)

Some time later I went on my annual retreat

to La Peyrouse, and the provincial spoke to us about Brazil... but that was all. In the end, it may have made an impression on me... A few weeks later, during a sleepless night, I said to myself: 'We preach about helping others (I had a catechism class in year 6), but in practice, what do we do? We do nothing.' Sleepless nights are always fruitful, that's when you think the best!

So during the night, I thought about it and said to myself: we're going to make a grapevine candle holder; each child will make their own candle holder, sell it, and we'll send the money to Diamantina in Brazil. That was my plan. At the time, Bro. Gérard Grimaud was in Diamantina. We were also in the same formation group. So that's what we did: the children scraped the vine stocks to prepare the candle holder, removing the bark, so that it would be beautiful. We made the holes, 3 or 4 to put the candles in...! The sum we sent to Diamantina was equivalent to two minimum wages for one employee. It was a good thing! We did it every year!

In 1980 or 1981, I was asked to take on the responsibility of the CCFD in Chinon; to tell the truth, I didn't have much time, between

teaching, making my objects... but I accepted, despite everything. In October 1982, I received a letter from the provincial, F. Camille Couton, who wrote to me: 'Would you accept to go to Brazil?' The answer was already made up in my head... but I said to myself: 'I'll pretend to think about it, it'll make it more serious...' and I waited a week before giving my answer... and of course I said YES... If I had refused, I wouldn't have had a clear conscience.

It really was Providence, as they say...

I remember that in 1954, when I started teaching, I thought: 'I hope they don't send me to the "five hundred devils"!!!' but throughout those years, this notion of being far away had matured in me...! On the other hand, to say that it was easy is another story... of course, I was ready to leave for Brazil, but leaving is never easy. You leave everything behind: you leave your family, your job, your country, it's the same for everyone... You leave with two suitcases and you come back 40 or 50 years later... with two suitcases!

Why did the provincial ask you to go to Brazil?

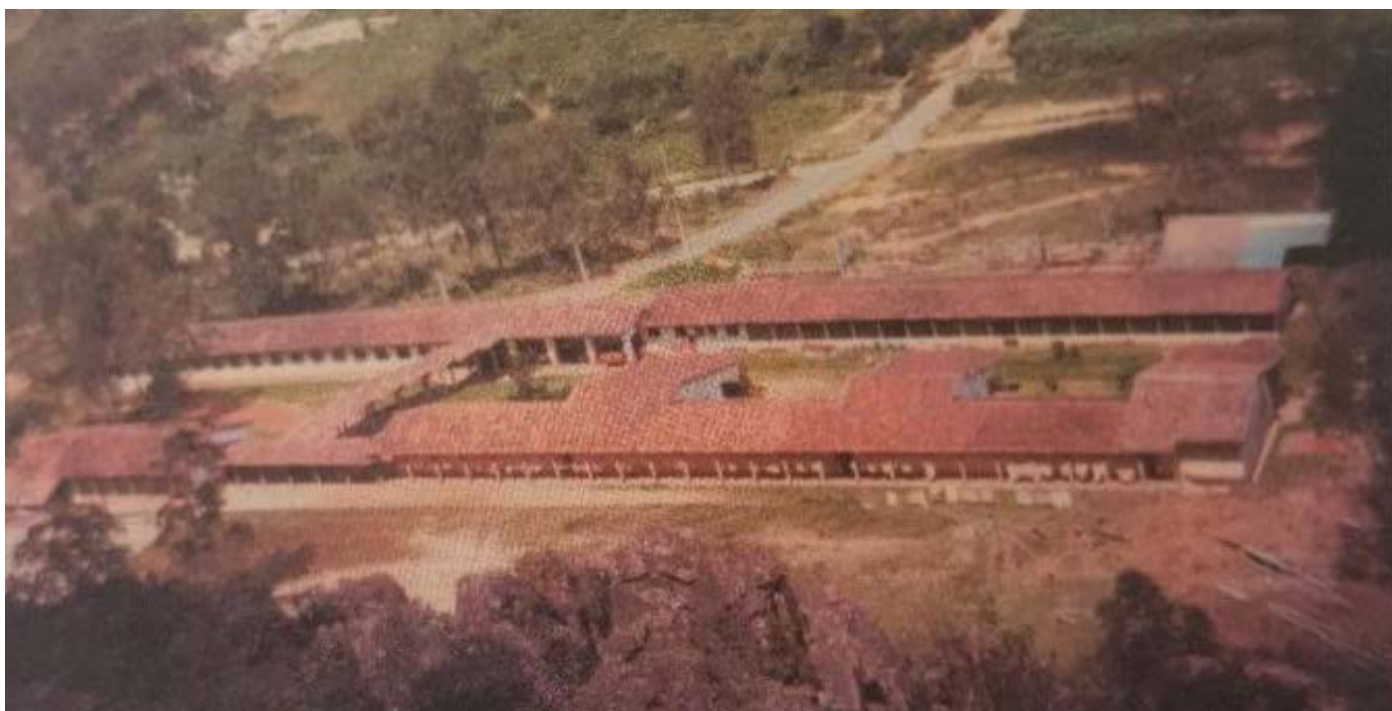
I was asked to go to Brazil to set up the carpentry workshop, even though I was more interested in ironwork. We left together, on the same day, with F. Michel Tardy, even though he was a carpenter, and he wasn't the one asked to go... when I think about it, it's something that's beyond my comprehension...

Once there, I must have received some training because I had to learn... a carpenter came to give me lessons... I must have learnt the language too. I knew Assimil by heart, but when I heard people speaking, I didn't understand a word! But I had still acquired a good foundation.

I would like to emphasise one point: my admiration for the pioneers! There are two in Diamantina: Bro. Gérard Grimaud and Bro. René Chéné, and then two others in Passos: Bro. Natal, an Italian, and Bro. Roger Bourcier. The work they did, wherever they were, each one of them, arouses deep admiration in me. We, the successors, only had to continue, and that can never be said enough! I suppose it's the same in Senegal, Madagascar and Haiti, for EVERYONE!

Just like those who stayed in France and who devoted themselves regardless of their profession, the commitment of each individual, wherever they are, is very important.





The Etablissement at Diamantina

How did the Diamantina story begin?

It was founded in 1911 by Sister Louise, sister of St Vincent de Paul. The sisters had a college, but Sister Louise was a little apart from the college and was keen to look after street children, both young children and young teenagers up to the age of 18.

Establishment in Diamantina Already in 1911?

Yes, an association was created: the Child Protection Society. They were given a property. Diamantina is a city built on a hillside: it's all sloping, it goes up, or it goes down! The society founded the 'asylum' (a word that comes from the Italian asilo = orphanage) that took in these children; Sister Louisa provided them with food, and they went out to work here and there. When Sister Louisa died, the succession was difficult.

Around 1967, the Brothers had already almost left education in Brazil; the State had taken over and the Brothers' colleges were somewhat surplus to requirements, which is why, after the Second Vatican Council, the Brothers turned their attention to the poor. There were Italian Brothers teaching in Brazil, the French arrived later.

Brother Natal, an Italian, was a bit like Sister Louisa: outside, in Carmo, he was keen to look after street children, then in Passos with Brother Roger Bourcier; in 1968, they founded the CAPP (Learning Centre for the Children of Passos) to look after children who were more or less living on the streets.

How did the Brothers end up in Diamantina?

It was a children's judge who asked the Bishop for a congregation to look after the children in Diamantina. Brother Natal went to have a look, and in January 1969, the Brothers arrived in Diamantina. Brother Jean Launay, who was a teacher, arrived and stayed for a year. It was too hard, and he was replaced by Brother Gérard Grimaud. (photo of the building) The building was named: EPIL, in honour of Sister Louise. It was very large: three dormitories for the boarders with three small houses planned, each with a family to supervise the young people, but this did not happen... there were the workshops (only the buildings) which were fitted out, little by little, by Brother Gérard Grimaud: the printing works, the carpentry workshop, the locksmith's shop, the engine rewind shop and a classroom for extra tuition for the children.



So, how many years did you spend at the EPIL in Diamantina?

After three and a half months studying the language in Brasilia, I arrived in Diamantina around 20 December 1983. I stayed there until 14 July 1990. For two years I learnt and taught carpentry. In August 1985, Brother Gérard Grimaud left Diamantina and I had to take over the management of the Centre and the printing work. In 1990, I couldn't take it anymore and I left for Passos (650 km away); but there I was surplus to requirements... Brother René Chéné taught plywood cutting to several groups of boys, so I had to find something else. I started working with the children, learning woodworking and how to use small machines (wood lathe, drill, sander, etc.) until one day in 1992, a doctor from Poiré sur Vie (Vendée), a former student of Brother Claude Perraud in Challans, visited us and said: 'I know someone in Le Poiré who can help you.' A man who lived near me, who gave lessons at the IMP in La Roche-sur-Yon to children who were behind in school; he made objects and had explanatory booklets. I received the booklets and got to work!

We started by making a sports car, a 24 Hours of Le Mans. That was the children's first job. They had to learn everything: tracing, measuring, using a set square, sawing, sanding, etc. When the job was finished, they came to show it to me. If there was a mistake, they had to find it. If they couldn't find it, I helped them. In short, in the end, the car was finished... What a success for each of these 10-11 year olds!

In 1999, we tried this approach with five girls, who worked alongside the boys. This mix was a very good thing: it stimulated the boys. The girls

even learned how to use the machines, so that when they started their apprenticeships in the workshop, they knew how to measure and were not afraid of the machines.

In 2003, when Brother Roger Drapeau replaced me in the workshop, it was one of those girls, who was then 15 years old, who introduced him to this kind of work.

Once the car was finished, I had to find other models: I thought of the tractor because it had all the secrets of the carpentry profession. And it worked! They all made their own tractor, 26 different parts in all. A sheet to follow for each part, a table with each of the parts as a model and an assembled tractor guided them in their construction. This work took several months. Other objects made were a trailer for the tractor, aeroplanes (a little more complicated than the tractor) and finally a lorry. At that stage, all they had to do was learn how to use the jigsaw. What a joy for those children!

In 2003, I was called back to Diamantina, where I stayed until 2009. I launched the same learning programme for the children there.

In 2011, you returned to France, correct?

When my return was decided, I wrote to Mr Patrick Padiou telling him that I was going back to France. During a meal at his house, he asked





me: 'What kind of machines do you need to work? A drill press, a sander, a circular saw...?'

I arrived in Machecoul in September 2011 (I was 77 years old) and started by cleaning everything out of the old workshop. It was hard! And it's true, I missed the machines.

One day, Patrick Padiou arrived with the machines I needed and even more. So I was able to get started. Unconsciously, I was deeply marked by Brazil and what I had experienced there. I decided to give all my wooden objects first to the associations: Sol'Esperança, which helped us so much in Diamantina, Cœur du monde, whose president is Patrick Padiou, helping children in Senegal, Madagascar and Haiti, Munay helping children in Peru, 'Diamantine ton coeur' helping children in Diamantina and then an association in San Sebastián, working for Madagascar.

Brother Henri spends whole days in his workshop in Machecoul, making not only toys for the children of the world, but also

magnificent little nativity scenes that bring joy to everyone at Christmas, as well as completely original statues and candleholders!

To cover your costs, do you sell these toys?

I give these toys away. First of all, my costs are minimal, as I am given a lot of scrap wood. And then, how could I ask for even one euro per toy from associations that have helped us or come to the aid of children. When you know that with one euro, a child in Haiti is entitled to a plate of rice and schooling for 5 days? No, I really won't charge anything, my work will be free.

How did you live in Diamantina?

The number of children increased little by little; most of them were orphans, or children with family problems, more or less living on the street. We reached 78, the maximum possible. I calculated the cost several times and each



time the result was the same, i.e. one minimum wage per child per month. We received very few donations. We had to live off our work. I always wondered how we managed.

Could you give us an example of a child you took in?

I could give you many, but one particularly stood out. At the beginning of 1990, our educator came to see me and said: 'Brother, do you have a place for a child who risks being killed if he stays at home (about fifty kilometres from Diamantina). Here's the situation: this child, Methuselah, aged 7, had a fight with his slightly older brother. The latter took a gun to kill him. Their mother intervened and she was the one who was killed. Now this child cannot stay at home where he risks being killed. Of course, I accepted the child, who caused us no problems. He grew up, studied, then did an apprenticeship in printing. At the age of 18, he had to leave the Centre. He entered the city seminary and was ordained in 2009. He gave the farewell speech at the mass when they left Diamantina in 2009. My eyes get moist when I think about it!

What would be your conclusion after this report?

I have only one word on my lips: a huge thanks! Thank the Lord for the good that He has allowed the brothers to achieve in Brazil... among other places!

What better testimony than that of our former students becoming our competitors in the profession that we taught them!



What better testimony than that of our former printing school students, around thirty of whom are working in Belo Horizonte, the capital of the State of Minas, and who welcome the children leaving EPIL to earn a living in the big city!

What better testimony than that of these same students who, every year, organise a Christmas party, with presents and festive afternoons, for the children of EPIL!

And finally, what better testimony than that of the alumni or friends, who do not hesitate to come to France (20,000 km return trip) not to visit the country or its capital, but to visit their Brothers! Let us give thanks to God for the work accomplished!



Istituto Ca' Florens Istrana



The Community of Ca' Florens consists of three Brothers. Bro Dionisio Santoro (Italian), Bro Onesphore Havyariamana (arrived in 2024 Burundi) and Bro Mathew Kavumkal who, arrived in 1979 from India.

This Institute was started just after the conclusion of the Second World War. During the war, the Treviso city was utterly destroyed by the bombs of Germany and America. As an outcome of the war, there were many orphan children who had no one to look after them. Then, one Diocesan Priest, Don Leo Alberton, started a home for all these children. As the priest was having difficulty managing it, the Brothers of the province of Italy were offered the charitable activity of looking after these children. The Brothers took charge of it and Bro Dionisio Santoro ran it very actively. In the year 1979, Bro Mathew Kavumkal also joined the team of Brothers to run the Institute for the poor and needy children. It was functioning well till 2014. During the 1st Government of Berlusconi, all the Institutes all over Italy were closed, and we, too, had to close the institute to comply with the rules of the Country.

But, in the year 1980, Bro Mathew Kavumkal, started a project to collect funds and help

poor and needy children for their educational expenses. This marvellous activity is very active even now. It started to function in India and in Khon Kaen, Thailand. Bro Philip Neri, of Indian origin, helped Bro Mathew Kavumkal for many years to work for the children of lepers in that area of Khon Kaen. Later, it expanded to the Philippines, Tanzania, Kenya, Burundi and Uganda.

From Istrana Village in Italy to Janho Village in Jharkhand:

Of late, I (Bro Mathew Kavumkal) was inspired to visit the Educational Projects of Bro Markose in the Village of Janho in the District of Latehar in the State of Jharkhand. No words are sufficient to describe the difficulties Bro





Markose. The teachers and the students are facing the challenge of procuring a bright future for their lives. I stayed with them for seven days. I was lucky to have a sheet-roofed shed for my stay there. Every night, rats were running all over the shed. I had my meals with the children, a simple rice. On one Sunday, I arranged for good meals for all the children. I am told that I am the first Brother to stay with them. So, I am very happy about it. I am also glad that I had the possibility to visit about 27 villages spread all over the forest. I am helping many students in these villages with their educational expenses. I express my deep appreciation to Bro Markose, to the teachers and the students of the Birsa Munda High School of Janho.

After my week-long mission in the villages, I had the blessing of visiting the St. Gabriel's Novitiate at Sitagarha of Hazaribagh. I enjoyed taking classes for the Novices for about two hours. I also offered a good festal dinner to the Novices and to the Novitiate Community. I am grateful

to the Novice Master Bro. B. A. Kurian, the Brothers and to the Novices for their hospitality and love.

New Year and beginning of monthly Spiritual Retreat of the Benefactors:

Every month, on the third Sunday, we celebrate the day of the spiritual Retreat of the Benefactors who help the children. This spiritual event started more than 30 years ago. The benefactors from the Provinces of Treviso, Vicenza, Padua, and Venice come for the Retreat. Others are very far away. In times of need, the Diocesan Priests also help us, especially for the celebration of the Mass.

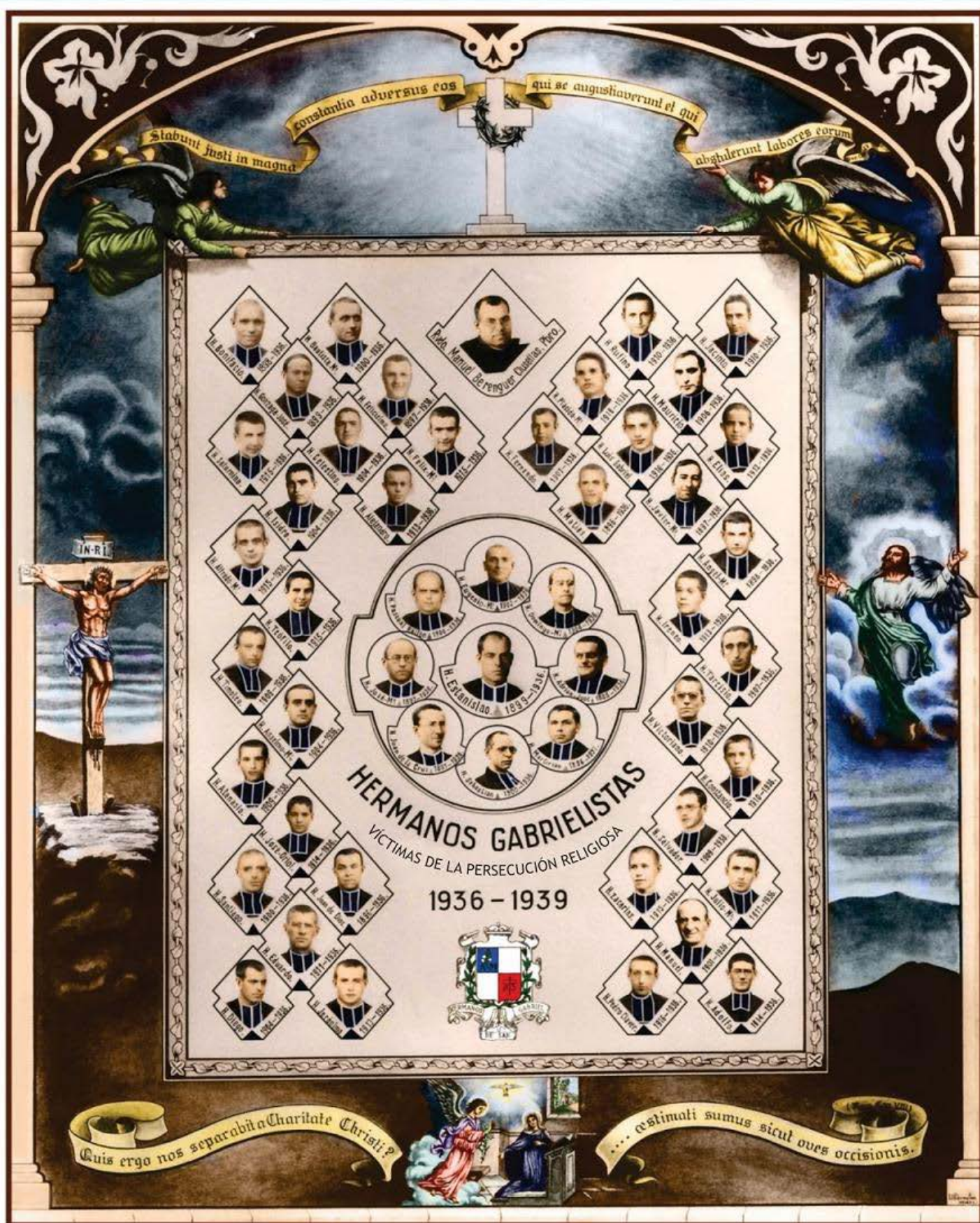
Regularly, groups of Scouts from various Parishes of our Diocese organise their outing and make their promises in our Institute. It is an ideal place for many groups.

Brother Anselmo María, 32 years old
Born in Cuzcurrita de Juarros
(Burgos)

In the Novitiate and during his scholasticate he was considered to be very shy but very sensitive, pious, animated and of a good spirit. He was assigned to the vestment area and laundry. His daily task was not easy, given the rudimentary means that were then available to perform those tasks, since all clothing was washed by hand and the smoke created in order to have hot water was very bothersome.

Brother Cyprius wrote of him in 1924 that he was not very open but he was very willing and was full of dedication. In conclusion, he was a good religious person. In his profession, he was charity personified. He attended to all with extreme kindness. He had a certain musical sensitivity and learned by ear, without receiving any lessons, to play some piano and the ocarina fairly well.

An insatiable worker, he had time for everything; he could be found in the laundry as easily as he could be seen helping out in the vegetable garden and in the kitchen. And when the summer heat was at its worst, he had the thoughtfulness of preparing refreshments for the Brothers, with lemon water from the abundant lemons found in the convent's vegetable garden. Even the members of the militia that saw the Brothers working commented: "You will not be mistreated because you are hard workers like Jesus and communists like us". However, that did not save them from death.

Martyrdom: Common narration

Brother Santiago, 36 years old
Born in Arrizala
(Alava)

He was assigned to military service in Tetuán and Morocco where he had to endure three long years in the hardest times of the African War. But he rose to the challenge and returned very happily to the community. In 1926 Brother Hermógenes, his Director, wrote of him that he continued to display evidence of a great sense of family and of much gentleness.

His first and only occupation was to be at the service of the Brothers in the kitchen of the Formation House of Can Valls. As head cook, he was an irrefutable artist of daily gastronomy experimenting with Spanish and French cuisine. The Brothers and pupils thoroughly enjoyed his surprise stews and in particular during community celebrations.

He was diligent in combining his work in the kitchen with his daily prayers, frequently in order to ensure the health of his spirit. He appeared to have a stern temperament but he smiled with satisfaction when he saw his hundred pupils, Brothers and students, enjoying and savouring his creations. He had no difficulty in serving a good meal to the henchmen of the F.A.I. when they assaulted Can Valls on the 7th of November and took the Brothers as prisoners.
